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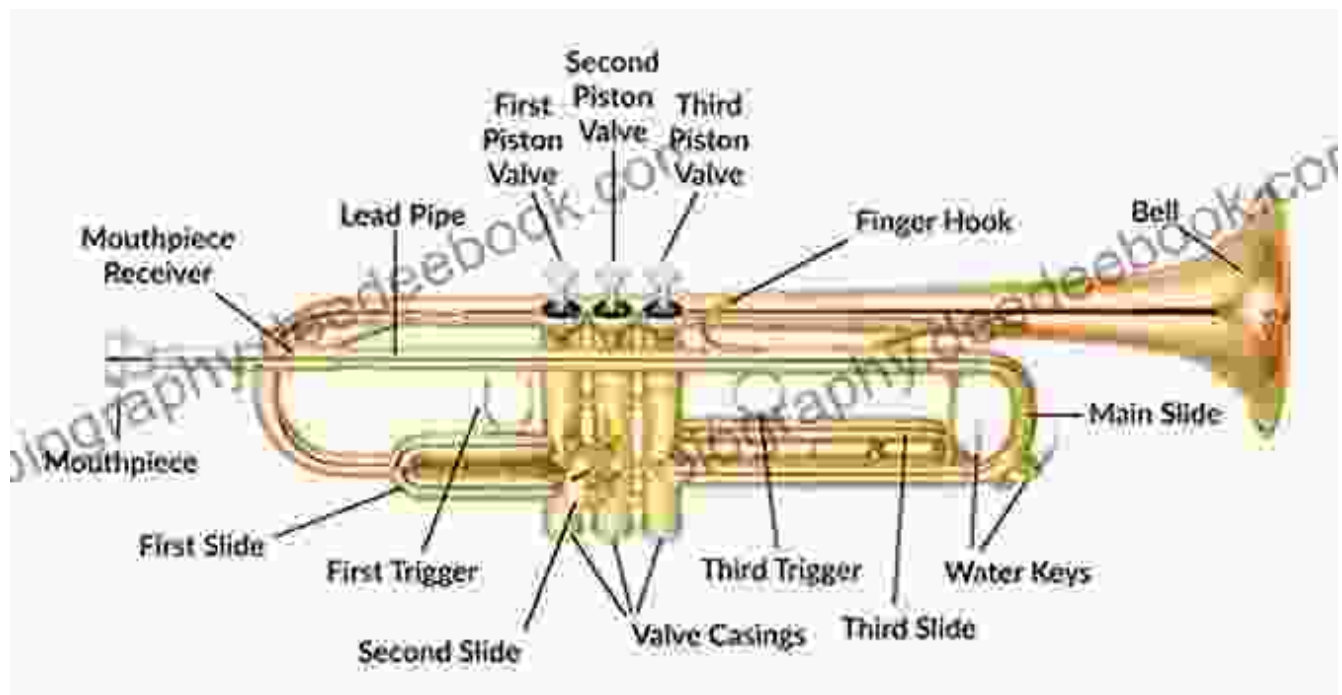

3. Your lips should be placed on the mouthpiece, with the center of your lips on the center of the mouthpiece.
4. Your teeth should be apart, and your tongue should be slightly behind your top teeth.

## **Embouchure**

Embouchure refers to the way you shape your lips and use your tongue to play the trumpet. A proper embouchure is essential for producing a good sound.



1. Your lips should be slightly pursed, with the center of your lips on the center of the mouthpiece.
2. Your teeth should be apart, and your tongue should be slightly behind your top teeth.
3. You should feel a gentle pressure on your lips, but not so much that it hurts.

4. Your air should flow smoothly through your lips and into the mouthpiece.

## **Section 2: Basic Trumpet Techniques**

### **Trumpet Fingering Chart**

- **Open (no valves pressed):** C4
- **1st valve:** Bb3
- **2nd valve:** G3
- **3rd valve:** Eb3
- **1st and 2nd valves:** F3
- **1st and 3rd valves:** Db3
- **2nd and 3rd valves:** Ab2
- **All valves:** Gb2

### **Long Tones**

Long tones are a great way to improve your sound and intonation. To play a long tone, simply sustain a single note for as long as you can, keeping your embouchure and air flow steady.

### **Scales**

Scales are a series of notes played in ascending or descending order. Practicing scales is a great way to improve your finger dexterity and overall technique.

### **Arpeggios**

Arpeggios are broken chords played one note at a time. Practicing arpeggios is a great way to improve your coordination and finger independence.
