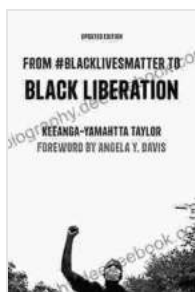


# From Black Lives Matter to Black Liberation: A Journey Towards Collective Empowerment and Freedom

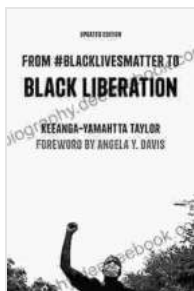
## **Challenges and the Way Forward**
